 - a. What is responsible for the quiet rage of the animals?

Animals do not like, when they are kept in zoos and have to live within a small space. That is the reason for their rage and anger. The tiger's 'quiet rage' is caused by his inability to get out of the cage. He silently fumes with anger.

b. Describe the image conveyed through velvet quiet.

The tiger's paws are padded to give his tread the advantage of silence. The padded parts are soft, almost like velvet and when it touches the ground, the sound is barely audible.

REFERENCE TO CONTEXT:

Notice the use of a word repeated in these lines.

- a. On pads of velvet quiet in his quiet rage.

 The word quiet is repeated to show a contrast between what the tiger is capable of and what it is actually doing.
- b. And stares with his brilliant eyes/ At the brilliant stars.

 Here the word brilliant is repeated to compare the tiger's eyes to the stars. They both are powerful and shiny.

Answer the following questions:

1. Why does the speaker think a tiger should go to a 'water hole'? In a jungle, the tiger's actual home, the water hole is a place where other animals come to drink water. This is the place where the tiger can hunt its prey. But in the zoo, the tiger does not get to hunt. The speaker thinks that the tiger should be there in the jungle, doing what it naturally does, instead of not waiting for someone to give food.

2. What is the message conveyed in the poem?

The message conveyed in the poem is that just like humans, animals too long for freedom and they do not like to be caged. He longs to be in the jungle, and he looks longingly at the shinning stars in the sky. By looking at the stars the tiger hopes to be with nature someday.

PARAGRAPH ANSWER:

1. Explain in your own words the contrast seen in the poem 'Tiger' by Leslie Norris.

The speaker brings the contrast between the present condition and where it should have been. The speaker begins by describing where the tiger is and what it is doing. Phrases such as 'quite rage' and 'stalks in his vivid stripes' highlight the tiger's power.

This is further stressed when the poet talks about how the tiger should have been snarling and terrorizing humans, making us realize the true strength and purpose of the tiger.

At the end of the poem, we understand the helplessness of the tiger when the speaker says that it locked in a concrete cell; 'stalking the length of his cage' and that he longingly stares at the stars in the sky.
