Countable Nouns:

Most nouns in English are countable. Countable nouns are objects that can be counted as separate units using numbers. We can put a number before them.

Ex: Car, Book, Pencil.

Uncountable Nouns:

Some nouns are uncountable. We cannot put a number before them.

Uncountable nouns cannot be separated and counted individually.

Ex: Oil, Snow, Flour.
